

# What you need to know:

- 1. Adverbs tell this information about a sentence:
- a. HOW someone is doing something
- b. TO WHAT EXTENT something is happening
- c. WHERE the sentence is taking place
- d. WHEN a sentence is taking place
- 2. Adverbs work alone.

If it takes a phrase to answer the adverb question, then it's not an adverb.

# 3. THESE words are ALWAYS adverbs:

not ~ -n't ~ very ~ quite ~ really ~ always ~ too ~ also ~ never



# ADVERBS—The Leftovers of Language

"What's that?" you ask.

If you can't identify a part of speech right off the bat, chances are you're looking at an ADVERB.



## NOUN

person / place / thing / idea

#### JOBS:

- \*subject
- \*direct object
- \*indirect object
- \*predicate nominative
- \*object of prep phrase



## **PRONOUN**

person / place~ / thing / idea I-you-he-she-it-they (~<u>sometimes</u> "there" or "here" act as pronouns, but usually they are ADVERBS)

#### JOBS:

- \*subject
- \*direct object
- \*indirect object
- \*predicate nominative
- \*object of prep phrase



# OR =

## **VERB**

or VERB PHRASE
ACTION or LINKING

#### IOBS:

- \*shows **action** of a subject visible or mental
- \*links a subject to something else shows it EQUALS another NOUN or an ADJECTIVE



## **ADJECTIVE**

Sits right before object it is describing OR on other side of LINKING VERB.

#### JOBS:

\*describes a NOUN or PRONOUN.

# ANSWERS the questions:

- \*Which one?
- \*What kind?
- \*How many?



## CONJUNCTION

#### JOBS:

- \*connects two or more items or phrases or clauses together
- \*COORDINATING conjunctions connect EQUAL items, phrases, or clauses (and, but, or, so)
- \*SUBORDINATING
  CONJUNCTIONS

connect a
dependent clause
to an independent
clause (although,
whenever, because,
etc.)



## INTERJECTION

## JOBS:

- \*expresses a strong emotion
- \*is set off from main sentence by a comma or an exclamation point



## **PREPOSITION**

## JOBS:

- \*pulls its NOUN or PRONOUN object into a sentence
- \*always in a bigger phrase that starts with a preposition and ends with a noun or pronoun
- \*If it isn't followed by an object, then it's NOT a preposition! (See ADVERB) \*functions just like ADJECTIVES (Which one? What kind? How many?) and ADVERBS

(Where? When? How? How

much?)







## **ADVERB**

### JOBS:

\*does whatever there's left to do in the sentence! \*works ALONE (see prepositional phrases)
