
Characteristics: (See BINDER Q1-C3)


~Contains a subject AND a verb


~Leaves the reader satisfied and without questions or looking for more information

~Groups of words that do not have BOTH subjects and verbs are called "phrases"

~Just as STRONG as a period [.]


~Separates independent clauses from one another



- *"Coordinating Conjunctions" are little words that join ideas, phrases, or clauses together.
 - ~When combined with a *comma*, these *conjunctions* become as powerful as a *period*. (Mrs. Nutter calls them a "Dynamic Duo" when the two are used together.)





~NO COMMA is used to separate *dependent/subordinate* clauses from the *independent clause* when they are placed at the END of the overall sentence (except sometimes when using THESE words: although, though, whether, where, and while).



Directions:

- 1. Look at each sentence and decide if it can be broken into two smaller clauses. (A **clause** is a group of words that has a SUBJECT doing or being a VERB.)
- 2. If the sentence *can't* be broken into smaller clauses, then it's a SIMPLE SENTENCE. Put a check mark in the SIMPLE SENTENCE column.
- 3. If the sentence *can* be broken into two smaller clauses, look for a comma with a FANBOYS conjunction or a semi-colon. If there *is* one, put a rectangle around it. EX. , and ; . Put a check mark in the COMPOUND SENTENCE column.
- 4. If the sentence *can* be broken into two smaller clauses, but one of the clauses leaves you hanging for more details if you say it alone, then draw a circle around the subordinating conjunction. EX. (decause) (although) (that) Put a check mark in the COMPLEX SENTENCE column.
